## "Giving and Receiving" Part One

The Apostle Paul quoted Jesus in Acts 20:35 when he said: "In everything I did, I showed you that by this kind of hard work we must help the weak, remembering the words the Lord Jesus himself said: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'"

During the Christmas season, when we think of giving, we tusually think about giving gifts to others, always hoping to find that "perfect" gift for someone. I think more often than not, as our families age, we find gift cards to be the best gift, allowing the recipient to choose something themselves, which is somewhat impersonal, but sure saves us all some frustration, and makes for fewer returns.

More of our (undivided) attention. More genuine interest in what they are saying or feeling? More respect and honor? More appreciation and less criticism?

In John 15:13, Jesus said: "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." Hey - what might happen if we gave Jesus more than the basic minimum requirements? More of our hearts? More of our undivided and uninterrupted attention? "Give, and it will be given to you…for with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." (Luke 6:38)

I believe God is saying to us if we will learn to lay our lives down for others, denying self and taking up the cross of Christ daily, we will begin to see a gradual, wonderful transformation in our lives, and we will truly begin to understand what Jesus meant when He said "It is more blessed to give than to receive."
